Mosnier, too, counseled the diverse array of individuals and groups contacting the SOHP for advice; joined Rep. David Price at an event celebrating the launch of the Veterans' History Project, a national oral history project set in motion by the Library of Congress and supported by local partners including the SOHP; and presented a four-week oral history short course via the Friday Center's "Community Classroom" series in April 2003. SOHP graduate research assistant Kerry Taylor was extremely active in a service roll, making oral history presentations to several classes on campus, co-teaching (with Melynn Glusman) the 2002 Friday Center short course, and twice offering his own "Documenting the African-American Freedom Struggle" course through the Center for Documentary Studies in Durham. Research assistant Angela Hornsby provided consulting support to the Atlantic Beach Historical Society project, for which she also conducted several interviews. Graduate research assistant Christina Snyder collaborated with a colleague at Duke University to prepare a "Guide to Documentary Resources" for the Triangle region. ■
